# **Programme Overview**

​ The aim of this programme is to provide a foundation level 'fine art' culture, with the focus on the public, commercial, collaborative and studio aspects of professional practice.

We will empower you to build the necessary skills to go on to manage your own creative aspirations and careers, in the professional practice of fine art and in the associated creative industries. We will support you to develop and apply skills to a high level in drawing, painting, digital and mixed media of practice, while developing your understanding of a range of concepts, theories and approaches to fine art and professional practice.

You will also develop a unique set of interpersonal, transferable and employability skills, working collaboratively to develop and produce industry-standard work. All students have access to their own studio space as well as access to bespoke workshop areas to support multi-disciplinary approaches to fine art practice. Students' artwork is often exhibited in our beautifully restored 1930s gallery, which has hosted work by Damien Hirst and Tracey Emin.

This programme offers a distinctive foundation for your creative development and learning experience, allowing you to establish your personal fine art identity and progress to further study or industry. Our fine art culture - linking studio-based practice, professional practice, and

contextual studies - provides you with a degree of flexibility in achieving your personal objectives.

During the programme, we will encourage you to participate in exhibitions, competitions, public art projects and study visits. Visiting lecturers enrich the programme further and provide valuable insight into various areas of professional practice.

# **Admission Criteria**

You require:

- A minimum of 48 UCAS points in an appropriate discipline
- Mathematics and English Language GCSEs at a minimum grade of C/4 or equivalent

We will also review your creative work to assess your previous experience and will be available to talk through any questions you may have.

Anyone who can demonstrate relevant work/life skills or knowledge can also be considered on an individual basis.

If English is not your first language, you will need to achieve an IELTS score of at least 5.5.

## **Career Options and Progression Opportunities**

Certificates of Higher Education provide a solid grounding in the related subject discipline and are aligned to level 4 of their respective BA (Hons) which means students can if they choose, apply to study level 5 of the corresponding programme at B&FC or apply to other HE providers (subject to meeting their requirements for admissions and/or RPL)

# Study Workload

You will be expected to attend all scheduled sessions and in addition to this engage in personal study, with scheduled sessions usually taking place over two days a week.

## **Programme Delivery: Learning and Teaching**

Scheduled time relates to the time you spend in directed study with the guidance and support of our academic tutors. Scheduled learning can take a variety of forms and will vary from one course to the next, but may include lectures, seminars, tutorials, project supervision, demonstrations, studio or workshop time, fieldwork and external visits.

Independent Study

Higher education courses rely on students undertaking work outside of formal, scheduled sessions and this is generally categorised as independent study. Independent study might include preparation for scheduled sessions, follow-up work, wider reading or practice, completion of assessment tasks and revision.

## **Programme Delivery: Assessment**

The programme is assessed entirely on coursework both written and practice-based. Coursework might range from written tasks and assignments to the collation of a portfolio of evidence based around a practical assignment. Coursework differs from exams in that it is usually non-timed and carried out independently within an extended time frame.

Practical assessments are part of your coursework and these identify your technical ability to apply theory to hands-on tasks in your chosen career area. They can be timed or non-timed and involve observation of your practical skills and competencies, either in the studio environment or a dedicated College setting.

## **Programme Delivery: Work Based and Placement Learning**

Many of the HE programmes at B&FC incorporate opportunities for work placements to provide you with the opportunity to link your studies to relevant professional practice in a real work environment. Our programme teams are able to offer support in securing an appropriate work placement where it forms part of your studies, but this is not a formal requirement.

## **Study Costs: Equipment Requirements**

You will need to spend approximately £250 p.a. on basic materials such as brushes, acrylics, oils, charcoal, drawing equipment etc. A full list of material requirements will be issued to you after enrolment. You should also be aware that there may be additional costs to consider such as optional educational visits and photocopying/printing.

# **Study Costs: Additional Costs**

During the programme you will be encouraged to participate in at least two programme outings. These will not be mandatory yet will give you the opportunity to experience real working environments, gaining an insight into professional culture and daily routines.
